Explanation: "A 2016 poll conducted by the University of Delaware concluded that 61 percent of Delawareans are in favor of the state legalizing marijuana. In that same year Colorado (which, in 2012, became the first state to legalize) an election poll revealed that 61 percent of residents thought legalization had a positive effect on the state's economy.

In addition to creating new jobs, estimates suggest we could bring in \$22 million in tax income in the first year alone. That number would likely increase: The total revenue Colorado received from taxes, licenses, and fees increased from \$76 million in 2014 to more than \$200 million in 2016.

As for the impact on our children, interestingly enough, marijuana use among teens has gone down in Colorado since legalization. Washington has seen similar decreases.

According to the American Journal of Public Health, Colorado has also seen a 6.5% reduction in deaths resulting from opioid abuse since legalization."
